

2021 Legislative Session Preview

- Divided Government Continues
 - Governor Roy Cooper (D)
 - NCGA Republican majority in both House and Senate
 - Who will be the early childhood champions?
- Key Issues
 - COVID-19?
 - Medicaid expansion?
 - Budget crisis looming impact on the 2021/22 budget?
 - Leandro Court Order State Plan Implementation?
- 2021 is Long Session starts January 13, 2021
 - Both Policy (bills) and Budget are likely

- New lobbying team




NC Early Education Coalition Policy Priorities

COVID-19 Child Care Crisis Attention

- Federal child care relief urgently needed!
- Stabilize current supply concerned about vacancy rates impact
- Workforce support to attract and retain qualified early educators
- Parents how to afford child care?
- Capacity going forward in 2021?
 - Analyze county level by ages and types of programs
 - Build supply up in areas with acute shortages

Top Line – Child Care is Essential! Maintain current level funding for all early childhood programs!


